

Throughout the Festival, information, maps, answers to questions, etc. may be obtained at Festival Headquarters during these hours: Thursday, 3:00–10:00 PM; Friday, 8:00 AM–10:00 PM; and Saturday, 9:00 AM–4:00 PM.

ADMISSION TO ACTIVITIES

All Festival registrants must have a ticket and name badge to attend Full-Length, Showcase, Opening, or All-State performances. Workshops are not ticketed, but name badges must be worn at all times or you will be asked to leave. Some workshops may fill to capacity and participants may be turned away. Dance tickets for Friday night can only be purchased in advance at the FEST GEAR store located in the lobby of the Krannert Center. Tickets for the dance are \$5. There will be no tickets sold at the door of the dance at the Illini Union. Students MUST wear their name badge to be allowed entrance to Friday evening activities.

LOST BADGES AND PROGRAM BOOKS

Badges must be worn at all times. Replacement badges may be purchased at Festival Headquarters for \$3 each. Additional program books are also available for \$4 each.

SWAP DESK FOR PERFORMANCE TICKETS

Krannert Lobby—in corridor next to Foellinger Great Hall. The Swap Desk will be open at 8:00 AM–8:00 PM on Friday and 9:00 AM–1:00 PM on Saturday.

LOCATIONS ACROSS CAMPUS

The Festival uses many building across campus. See the facing page for a campus map. All buildings are within relatively short walking distances from one another.

INSIDE THE KRANNERT CENTER (SEE MAPS ON PAGES ##)—

The following rooms are located on Level 2, which is the lowest level of the Krannert Center:

Choral Rehearsal Room, Dance Rehearsal Room, Dance Rehearsal Dressing Room, Drama Rehearsal Room, Great Hall stage (for Tech Olympics), Orchestra Rehearsal Room

The following rooms are located on Level 3/Blue Parking Wing. To get to this level, go down the south stairs from the lobby, on the house right side of the Great Hall; or, from Level 2, go up the south stairs, near the Audio Office:

AV Room, Studio 1, Studio 2AB, TV Studio

The following rooms are located on Level 4/Theatre Wing. To get to this level, go down the north stairs from the lobby, on the house left side of the Great Hall; or, from Level 2, go up the north stairs, near the Production Office:

Design Center, Drafting Studio, CAD Lab

DIRECTIONS FROM THE KRANNERT CENTER TO ...

Lincoln Hall, Gregory Hall, Foellinger Auditorium, University YMCA, the Illini Union, and Noyes Lab

Exit the west lobby doors (on either side of the KCPA Ticket Office) and cross Goodwin Avenue to the walkway between the two science buildings. Continue straight ahead until you reach the Quad. At the far south end of the Quad (to your left) is Foellinger Auditorium (the building with the gold dome). The building on the right (west) of Foellinger is Gregory Hall, and the building next to Gregory on the north is Lincoln Hall. The University YMCA is located west of Lincoln Hall, directly across Wright Street. At the far north end of the Quad (to your right) is the Illini Union. Noyes Lab is located to the right (east) of the Illini Union.

Illinois Street Residence Hall (ISR) and Levis Faculty Center

Exit the east lobby doors (on either side of Foellinger Great Hall). The Illinois Street Residence Hall is the large building across the street to your left (north). The Levis Faculty Center is across Gregory Street in front of you, on the corner of Gregory and Illinois streets.

Music Building

Exit the south lobby doors (down the hallway next to the Festival Theatre). The School of Music Building is across the street on your right.

Wesley Foundation

Exit the west lobby doors (on either side of the KCPA Ticket Office). Cross the street and walk to your right (north), down Goodwin Avenue. The Wesley Foundation is the large church building on the corner of Goodwin and Green streets. Enter in the door near the parking lot on the south side of the building.

PARTICIPATION GUIDELINES

- Festival participants are expected to attend and be a part of Festival-sponsored activities and performances.
- Take full opportunity of the Festival by arriving on time for workshops and performances. Tickets for performances are valid only until published performance times. At published curtain times, empty seats will be filled by participants who do not have tickets.
- If you, or your school, have performance tickets that you are not going to use or swap, please turn them in to one of the swap desks at least 30 minutes before curtain time.
- Information about the Ticket Swap Desks for ticket exchange can be found on page XX of the Festival program.
- As an audience member, you are part of the performance, but you are not a performer. Therefore, good manners toward those on stage are extremely important.
- No one may save seats for any performance.
- No food or drink is allowed in the theatres and workshop spaces, with the exception of bottled water.
- The use of any audio or video recording device or camera in any theatre is prohibited. This includes picture and video phones.
- Please plan to maintain a full schedule on both Friday and Saturday. Get plenty of rest so that you do not find yourself losing interest or energy in the middle of the day. Many professionals and schools have donated time to provide quality workshops and shows. Please show your appreciation by attending every event that you can.
- You must wear your Festival badge to all events, including Friday night activities. Your badge must include your full name and school name. Note: A sponsor, monitor, or University staff member has the right to ask to see your badge. Replacement badges must be purchased at Festival headquarters (for \$3.00) if originals are lost. Replacement Festival Program books are also available (for \$4.00).

- The use of drugs/alcohol during attendance at the Festival is absolutely prohibited. Parents of a student who is found in violation will be contacted and requested to remove the student immediately—no matter what time of the day or night.
- Smoking is prohibited in all University buildings.
- Students are not allowed to smoke on campus or in the hotels.
- Students should travel in groups of at least three and inform their chaperone of their schedule. Emergency phones are located throughout the campus and will connect you to the campus police if needed. (Refer to back of name badge for numbers.)
- Curfew: City ordinance requires that no minor be on the streets without an adult after 11:00 PM on Thursday and 11:59 PM on Friday.
- Please remember that you are representatives of your school's theatre program and conduct yourselves accordingly. The Festival is a time to share new ideas and concepts. It is expected that you will be polite and receptive at all performances and workshops.
- Also, courteous behavior is expected at Champaign-Urbana area hotels, restaurants, and stores.

PROFILES OF SCHOOLS PRESENTING PRODUCTIONS

EFFINGHAM HIGH SCHOOL

At Effingham High School (*The Spitfire Grill*), there are approximately 800 students; there are about 50 students in the Drama Club. They generally do two productions per year, a fall play and a spring musical. Due to the number of students interested in being a part of our productions, and the number of roles presented in this year's fall production, they did double-cast their show. Recently, they've added a summer show in their community park, where anyone may attend for free and sit on their blanket or lawn chair, with a hillside view. This year, they've also added a Christmas tea show. They do not offer any theatre classes at EHS. There are two teachers involved with the theatre program, and many parents who volunteer their time to their program.

GENOA-KINGSTON HIGH SCHOOL

The Genoa-Kingston (Sarah, Plain and Tall) Drama Department is an extracurricular group that strives to provide educational theater opportunities in both on-stage and technical capacities. The drama department and International Thespian Society Troupe 867 have worked hard to provide a quality theatrical experience, for both the students involved in our fall and spring productions as well as for our audience. Operating with no drama classes offered by the district, many of our students come into the high school with little more than an interest for the stage. By taking on a wide variety of comedic and dramatic productions, they have cultivated that interest into talent at the high school level and beyond. Many of our students have continued to pursue drama after graduation. They have also helped generate interest in theater with younger students, which in turn have resulted in what we hope will be regular plays at the middle school level. In fall 2008, they held a three-day drama clinic for students in grades 6-12.

GLENBROOK SOUTH HIGH SCHOOL

Glenbrook South High School (*Comedy Sportz*) has approximately 2,700 students enrolled. There are two high schools in this district, North and South. Glenbrook South is located in Glenview, Illinois. It has a wide range of performing arts curricular and extracurricular activities. Each year, the drama and music departments of the North and South schools combine their efforts to produce a musical production. They produce three productions each year plus Spur of the Moment (their improvisational drama group), V-Show, Orchesis, Dance Company, De La Cru dance group, Paradox (studentoriginated production group), and Stage Crew activities.

GUILFORD HIGH SCHOOL

Guilford High School (*Vanities*) has 2,000 students enrolled at the high school, one of four in the district.

Two hundred and fifty students participate in the theatre department. Four years of acting and technical theatre classes are offered. Guilford typically does one winter play, a spring musical, and a one-act play festival. The Drama Club sponsors a Drama Club showcase. The program is served by two full-time teachers.

HOFFMAN ESTATES HIGH SCHOOL

Hoffman Estates High School (*Plaza Suite*), in Hoffman Estates, Illinois, is a school of about 2,000 students. Over 200 students are involved in the theater program. It serves a larger and diverse community of varying social-economic statuses. It is part of Township High School District 211 and has one drama class that is available to sophomores, juniors, and seniors as an English elective. The theater program is an extracurricular program that focuses on expanding the community and students' exposure to theater. There are three main stage productions (a fall play, a musical, and a spring play), a variety show (with Comedy Troupe), a madrigal dinner, a senior show written and run by the students, a Mr. Hoffman Hawk contest, and various other studentled productions through the year.

HOMEWOOD-FLOSSMOOR HIGH SCHOOL

Homewood-Flossmoor High School (*Go, Dog. Go!*) Three thousand students attend the school, with 120 to 200 students involved in the theatre program, which produces seven shows during the school year and the summer. There are six theatre classes offered in the school curriculum, and four faculty members involved in the theatre program.

J. STERLING MORTON HIGH SCHOOL

J. Sterling Morton High School (*The Misadventures* of *Millie K. Toast*) serves over 8,000 students from the communities of Berwyn, Cicero, Forest View, Lyons, McCook, and Stickney. The West Campus theatre program performs three full-length productions a year, plus a showcase for new talent called Fresh Faces. Theatre classes include Performance, Stage Craft, and a two-year Studio class that produces both original plays as well as published scripts throughout the school year. The Drama Club focuses mostly on improvisation and the creation of original works and performs two to three shows a year.

JOHN HERSEY HIGH SCHOOL

John Hersey High School (Company) is located in the suburbs of Chicago. Its theater program comprises three main stage productions, a Children's Theater program, student-directed one-acts, and four levels of acting classes. About 250 students participate in some aspect of the theater program.

JOHNSBURG HIGH SCHOOL

Johnsburg High School (*Look Homeward, Angel*), located in Northern McHenry County, has 920 students. Over 150 students participate in the extracurricular theatre program. Three full-length productions are performed each year, usually a drama in the fall, a musical in February, and a comedy in the spring. Director Roger Zawacki has run the program for 30 of the school's 31-year existence. Performances are in the school's 700-seat theatre-in-the-round. The theatre can convert from arena staging to a thrust stage.

KEITH COUNTRY DAY SCHOOL

Keith Country Day School (*Quilters*) Theater Department serves the students of the middle school with classes of Drama 6, Drama 7, and Drama 8. Upper school students take Theater I, Theater II, and Tech Theater. The department produces four productions a year, two for the middle school, and two main stage productions for the upper school; a comedy or drama in the fall; and in the spring, a musical.

LAKE ZURICH HIGH SCHOOL

Lake Zurich High School (*The Wedding Singer*), located in the northwest Chicago suburbs, serves about 2,200 students, and has about 150 students involved in the theatre program. The extracurricular program produces three shows a year: a fall show, a Children's Theatre production, and a spring musical. The theatre curriculum is set up as a building-block program. These are the course offerings: Drama I, Drama II, Drama III; Studio Theatre 1; Studio Theatre 2; Honors Level Studio Theatre; and Technical Theatre. The faculty/staff involvement includes one theatre teacher, one vocal music director, and a technical director. Lake Zurich Theatre is proud of its strong parent/community volunteer base that supplements the production staff for each show.

LIBERTYVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

Libertyville High School (*Endangered Species*) is located in the far north suburbs of Chicago. With an enrollment of 2,000, the school serves the northern end of District 128 (Vernon Hills High School serves the southern end). There are four productions per year: fall musical, a winter play, a student-directed one-act play festival, and a spring play. The theatre curriculum consists of Introduction to Theatre, Acting Studio, and Theatre Technology. There are three staff members who work on the plays and seven who work on the musicals.

LOYOLA ACADEMY

Loyola Academy (*The Yellow Boat*) is a Jesuit college preparatory school of 2,000 students serving Chicago and the northern suburbs. Each year, over 150 students are enrolled in one of five year-long theatre classes and an additional 130 participate in the co-curricular Thespian program, which is responsible for six productions a year. These programs are supported by two full-time theatre teachers as well as a full-time vocal music teacher, and two full-time dance teachers.

MCHENRY EAST CAMPUS HIGH SCHOOL

McHenry High School, East Campus (*File under Miscellaneous*) is a suburban school of about 950 students located northwest of Chicago. Our theatre program includes approximately 120 students, who remain active in the three main stage productions (two straight shows and one musical), as well as numerous student-directed and showcase work that they produce throughout the year. Based on the production, our staff includes between one and six adult directors. Students receive the opportunity of taking two elective theatre courses during the course of their education: Introduction to the Theatre and the college-preparatory Literature of the Theatre class.

MOLINE HIGH SCHOOL

Moline High School (*The Foreigner*) has roughly 2,000 students, with around 100 participating in the theatre program. The curriculum only offers one elective course: Theatre Arts and Literature; however, the program is growing due to the enormous support from the extracurricular programs developed, including 3 main stage productions each year (2 plays and 1 musical), a night of dessert theatre and festival of one-acts, Encore! (a competitive acting troupe), and drama club. Three teachers help support this program as well as a dedicated group of parents, "The Drama Boosters."

NILES WEST HIGH SCHOOL

Niles West High School(The Complete History of America, abridged), located in Skokie, is a diverse and energetic school of over 2500 students. Niles West High Schools Fine Arts Program, along with its sister school Niles North, was recognized in 2007 as having the #1 Fine and Performing Arts Education Program in the Nation by the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. The theatre program offers eight semesters of theatre coursework, including classes in acting, directing, stagecraft, advanced theatre studio and play production, and presents a theatre season of five main stage plays and 2 studio productions. There are nearly 175 students who participate in curricular and co-curricular theatre activities at the school. Niles West Theatre features one fulltime theatre director, along with a set, costume, props, lighting and sound designer for each of the main stage productions, as well as a technical director and auditorium manager.

SAINT CHARLES NORTH HIGH SCHOOL

Saint Charles North High School (*Diet Mountain Dew*) has over 2,000 students. Throughout the year, we have at least 75 to 100 students who participate in one way or another in our theatre program. We have four performances every year—fall and winter production, a spring musical, and junior/senior directed one-acts. In our Curriculum, we currently have Acting 1, Acting 2,

and Introduction to Theatre Production and Direction. We have a total of four teachers involved in the drama program.

SAINT PATRICK HIGH SCHOOL – CHICAGO, ILLINOIS

Saint Patrick High School (Amadeus) is a school of approximately 915 students. It is the oldest all boys private Catholic school in Chicago. They are a Thespian troupe of 18, and they have around 20-30 active members involved in their productions. As they are an all boys school, they cast their female roles from schools around Chicago area. Their most recent women have come from Resurrection High School, Trinity High School, St. Scholastica Academy, and East Leyden High School. They produce a fall play, a spring musical, and each semester they produce a student-run production. This semester, they produced a new play written by a Carbondale playwright to rave reviews! Their spring musical this year will be West Side Story. They also produce a summer community/ semi-professional program, the Saint Patrick Summer Theatre, which produces one piece. This summer, they will be producing Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat.

UNITY HIGH SCHOOL

Unity High School (*Sure Thing*) is a school of approximately 470 students, Unity High Schools Drama program consists of 40 students who are involved in 3 productions a year- 2 plays and a musical.

Unity is nestled in a rural community 15 miles south of Champaign-Urbana.

UNIVERSITY HIGH SCHOOL – NORMAL, ILLINOIS

University High School – Normal, Illinois (*Lend Me a Tenor*) is a public school/laboratory school at Illinois

State University. The school was recently recognized as one of the top schools in the nation by *Newsweek*. Enrollment is just over 600 students and over 90 are active in theatre throughout the year. Two main stage productions—one a musical—and an evening of one acts are the produced yearly. The troupe also participates in Group Interpretation and performs within the community. Philanthropy is also part of our program this year the troupe collected books for a reservation school in Arizona, contributed to public radio, and collected canned goods as part of TOTS (Trick or Treat so Kids can Eat). Other activities and theatre trips are planned yearly.

VERNON HILLS HIGH SCHOOL


Vernon Hills High School (*The Love of Three Oranges*) through its own Blacklight Theatre Company, which produces three main stage plays a year, one musical and two straight plays, and also produces a night of Student Directed One-Acts. Plays have included Amadeus, Museum, and The Wiz. VHHS has two Acting Classes and a Theatre Technology class. VHHS has three full time staff members involved in the theatre who loves to work with their 80+ theatre students.


VICTOR J. ANDREW HIGH SCHOOL

Victor J. Andrew High School (*Noises Off*) has approximately 2,400 students and about 150 of them are involved in the theatre program. We mount five productions a year, which includes two straight plays, two musicals, and a group interpretation production. We also assist in the annual variety show. We offer a junior/ senior level "Acting and Drama" class as well as opportunities to join the Drama Club. There are currently eight teachers involved in the various aspects of the theatre program, and we have a wonderfully supportive community that comes out to support our work throughout the school year.




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

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Teachers have two types of professional development opportunities through their participation in

Festival activities: graduate credit courses through Illinois State University and CPDUs available through the Illinois Theatre Association, both of which are approved providers.

The School of Theatre at Illinois State University will again extend graduate offerings in conjunction with the Festival in 2009. The following opportunities are available this year:

1. Theatre 408 (Directed Projects) Spring 2009

1–4 hours of credit may be earned for directing a project (Full-Length or Showcase; the project need not be selected for presentation at the Festival), presenting a Festival workshop, responding to Full-Length or Showcase productions at other schools for Festival 2009, directing a Spring semester production, or curriculum design and development for current or future semesters.

2. Theatre 309 (Directed Projects) Spring 2009

1–3 hours of credit may be earned for design work (costumes, scenery, sound, lights, props) for any project entered for the response process in the Festival or Spring work. Again, the project need not be selected for Festival performance.

3. Theatre 493.01 (Workshop in Theatre as an Interscholastic Activity in the Secondary Schools) Spring 2009

2 hours of credit for this course (which is repeatable) is generated through workshops and a program attended during the Festival and does not interfere with the teacher's responsibilities to students. This workshop carries graduate-level credit and is a recognized elective in the master's program. If the outline of course content is required for administrators, please contact the School of Theatre at Illinois State University.

Teachers registering for the above courses do not have to be admitted to a formal degree program at Illinois State University. Credits are transferable to other degree programs. All are repeatable.

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
